
## <u> Year 3 - Parks Class</u>

As part of this exploration, we considered the reasons why we work, and we ranked some possible reasons by order of importance in a 'diamond 9' formation. We had lots of varying ideas on what was important! We also thought about different job types and the amount they are paid. We had a go at putting some jobs in order by what we assumed their annual salary was, before finding out how accurate we were – some of the real annual salaries really surprised us! We very much enjoyed our exploration into money this week.

#### EARHART

Earhart's have been learning about how we can look after our money, how we save our own money, looking at different types of bank accounts. We learnt about how interest and borrowing works, and investigated how much interest we would need to pay if we took out a small loan. Finally, we explored how we can help others with money, what fair trade is and our responsibility to our global community.



#### THUNBERGS





During money week we thought about the way we use and spend money. We looked at and decided how much we would spend, how much we would save and how much we would give away from an amount or money and importantly – why we made those decisions. We also looked at taxes and being charitable.

#### **National Sleep Helpline:**

We are sending information about this wonderful free resource that can help parents and children to learn more about their sleep and develop better bedtime routines. Sleep is essential to brain function, by helping children to sleep better, we can help them to succeed in school.

At any given time up to 40% of adults and 50% of children (this rises to 80% with a SEND diagnosis) have difficulties with their sleep. Yet in a recent survey, almost 60% of adults felt there was a lack of support for sleep issues. Sleep problems can leave people feeling isolated and lonely.

The free helpline is run by trained sleep advisors, many of whom are specialists in working with SEND. They can talk to young people directly, or parents (we can also talk to adults, including older people, about their sleep issues).

The helpline is open 5 times a week, Monday, Tuesday, Thursday evenings 7-9pm, and Monday, Wednesday mornings 9-11am. The number is 03303 530 541.
